The baptism of Edward William has yet to be located, however, his life is fairly well documented.

Married in the Parish Church of Poplar on Friday the ¹⁴~~21~~th August 1837, a bachelor of full age, residing in Poplar, one of the many cowkeepers in the East End of London. Both bride and groom placed their X in the parish register. As so often happens Edward, for some reason best known to himself, had given his name as William Edward Walland.

Their first daughter was born before the end of the year, but died in infancy. Within a very short space of time Susan was again pregnant and appears to have returned to her mother's home in Stratford for the birth of the second Mary Ann.

Edward changed from a Dairyman to a Greengrocer between the 51-61 census periods. Perhaps this is when his mother-in-law died and left a small inheritance for Susan and Edward, enabling them to start their business.

The world pandemic of cholera which began in 1863 did not finally die away until nine years later and one of those to die during the outbreak in England was Edward's younger brother John at the age of 39, also a dairyman. According to the death certificate John had been suffering from malignant cholera for 7 days and had been taken into the home of his brother Edward at 155 High Street, Shadwell, where he died on the 29th July 1866.
